A BRIEF HISTORY OF KEIRA

Keira High School is a comprehensive, co-educational school that has a long tradition of delivering quality education to the community of Wollongong. The school was established in 1917 as Wollongong Junior Secondary Technical School. In 1939 land was purchased near the Princes Highway, Fairy Meadow on which new school buildings were later built. In 1954 the school moved onto this site in Lysaght Street. Some years later, the school was renamed Keira Boys' High School. In the early 1980s, the State Government determined that the school would become co-educational with the first female students enrolling in 1984. The school was renamed Keira High School. In 1990, the school became a technology high school. Today, Keira High School is proud of its rich history and traditions but looks to the future as a confident, innovative and dynamic school.



THE SCHOOL CREST

The school's crest is a traditional shield designed and adopted in 1984 when the school became coeducational. It represents both strength and protection. The school's motto since 1917, Excelsior, is the comparative form of Excelsus, Latin for high or lofty, Excelsior then means 'ever higher'. Longfellow, the American poet, provided Keira's first teaching staff with the inspiration to adopt the word Excelsior as our motto. Longfellow wrote a poem on the incessant aspiration for youth to achieve, ending with the line, "A voice replied, 'For up the height, Excelsior'".

As their learning journey moves into high school we believe the same smaller class size is of critical importance again. We prioritise our resources to create reduced class sizes in all Year 7 classses to ensure that all our students make the strongest start possible.

The whole school community has a relentless commitment to adding value for every student every year. This is achieved through a strategic and focused program that identifies expected growth in learning for every student at Keira High School. This is a key process in our 2021-2024 School Plan.

Personalised Learning

The Personalised Learning and Engagement team work collaboratively with classroom teachers, parents and students to personalise the learning experience for every child at Keira High School.

We are committed to the wellbeing of all students at Keira High School. This is focused on strengthening their cognitive, physical, social, emotional and spiritual development.


Students develop self-awareness and emotional intelligence to support their wellbeing in order to be self-regulating in their learning and their interactions with other members of the school community.

Quality Learning starts with Quality TeachingThe Stage 4 Curriculum (Years 7 and 8)

EXCELSIOR

In Excelsior, every Year 7 student expands their knowledge about effective learning, developing self-awareness and autonomy. Through reflection, collaboration and rigorous goal setting, students consider what they can do to improve their own learning.

Excelsior includes four key topics; asking why, creation, transfer and prediction. Each topic is one component of exceptional learning. Students take what they learn in each topic and apply it to their other subjects as well their lives outside of school. This subject aims to foster lifelong learning.

ABORIGINAL STUDIES



Great traditions, a confident future.

Keira High School was the first school in the state to include Aboriginal Studies as a separate course for Year 7. Every course in Stage 4 incorporates an Aboriginal perspective but this course allows all students to gain a deeper understanding of Aboriginal Peoples of Australia and their culture.

Aboriginal Studies provides students with the unique opportunity to gain knowledge and understanding of Aboriginal Peoples of Australia, their culture and their lifestyles. This course is an exploration and celebration of Aboriginal social and cultural heritage and its longevity. Students have the opportunity to gain authentic Aboriginal perspectives through the teachings of local and regional Aboriginal community members and explore the diverse and changing nature of Aboriginal culture.





ENGLISH

The English Faculty at Keira High School is a dynamic, creative and enthusiastic faculty that consistently provides challenging а and sophisticated quality teaching and learning environment for every student. It is comprised of a diverse and talented group of people who form a cohesive team; these individuals range from new and beginning teachers to those who are experienced and passionate about their profession, encompassing experience and expertise.

English is a compulsory subject for all students. Senior courses offered include: English Extension 1 and 2, Advanced, Standard and English Studies.



The faculty is excited about their innovative and improved programs that align with the new curriculum. There remains a strong focus on the explicit teaching of grammar and spelling.

We deal with a variety of texts that range from Shakespeare to picture books to classics and




modern Australian plays and novels that deal with a plethora of concepts and contemporary issues. Visual literacy is a vital component of the English courses, which allows for the study of many historical and modern films as texts.

It is essential to acknowledge the role that the First Peoples of our nation have played in our heritage. Consequently, many of our texts and programs deal respectfully and sensitively with indigenous issues in a variety of textual forms.

Student engagement is enhanced through the use of Information and Communication Technology (ICT) in all English classrooms.


MATHEMATICS

The Mathematics courses at Keira High School aim to create confidence and enjoyment in doing mathematical and numerical activities. Students develop an awareness of how mathematics can be used to solve problems in everyday life. They also learn of its contribution to the development of society. Students are encouraged to develop their mathematical thinking, understanding, confidence and competence in solving mathematical problems.



Mathematics courses also aim to develop knowledge, skills and understanding in the following areas:

- logical, flexible, fluent and original thinking
- computation and problem solving skills
- appropriate language for the effective communication of mathematical ideas and concepts
- an ability to recognise mathematical patterns and relationships
- a variety of methods for calculation and problem solving
- an awareness of the basic structure of mathematics by an appreciation of the nature and interrelationship of the various strands of mathematics



Mathematics is a compulsory subject for all students in NSW from Year 7 to Year 10 (optional in Year 11 and Year 12). The Mathematics syllabus recognises that students develop mathematical skills at different rates to those in other subjects. For this reason the Mathematics course is a continuum of learning that occurs from the beginning of primary school to the completion of Year 10.

At Keira High School, the Mathematics Faculty fully supports the spirit of the learning continuum by offering differentiated learning in all Year 7 classes, while incorporating two classes for extension courses in Year 8. In Years 9 and 10, there are three separate pathways of study (5.1, 5.2 and 5.3 Courses) and these are offered to students' dependant on their results at the end of Year 8.



SCIENCE



The faculty prides itself on quality teaching, providing innovative and progressive experiences to all students. Naturally there is an emphasis on practical work (including field work) and this is supported through class activities that employ a wide variety of strategies.

Science is a compulsory course for Years 7 to 10. In Years 9 and 10 there is the option of studying the elective course *Marine and Aquaculture Technology*. For Years 11 and 12 the courses *Biology, Chemistry* and *Physics* are currently offered as options for the Higher School Certificate.



Facilities at Keira include seven teaching laboratories and associated preparation rooms and stores. Two of our labs have recently been refitted with a more modern and efficient layout and new fittings and are now state-of-the-art practical and teaching rooms. All of the teaching laboratories at Keira feature data projectors and audio systems. At present four Science laboratories have interactive whiteboards and further acquisitions should see this number grow shortly.

The Science faculty at Keira High School is currently made up of nine teachers including a Head Teacher. Most of these teachers have experience of teaching two or more of the senior courses and, in most cases, accreditation to teach three or more of these.

The faculty represents a collective experience of over 80 years of teaching Science yet contains teachers in the early stages of their careers. Another aspect of the depth of knowledge within the faculty is 32 years working in practical applications of Science outside of education including chemical chemical monitoring. manufacturing. control and microbiology. This 'real world' experience adds considerably to the collective expertise of the faculty. Experience with HSC marking, high ICT skills and networking with professional groups adds further capacity to the team.

HUMAN SOCIETY AND ITS ENVIRONMENT



The Human Society and Its Environment (HSIE) This diverse range of subjects requires a diverse faculty at Keira High School is diverse and offers a teaching staff. In the HSIE faculty we have number of different subjects to students including teachers in their early careers, but, also a number History and Geography in the junior years and then of teachers that have up to 20 years or more subjects such as Business Studies, Legal Studies, experience in teaching. Economics, Society and Culture, Ancient and Modern History in the senior years. We also offer elective subjects to students in Years 9 and 10 including Commerce and Elective History.





Our assessments cater for a range of students and equip them with an understanding of the skills necessary to excel in the 21st Century. The knowledge and skills developed whilst doing a HSIE subject at Keira High School will allow our students to become articulate, critical thinkers and understand the importance of their rights and responsibilities as Australian and global citizens.

LEARNING and ENGAGEMENT

STUDENT WELFARE

The role of this team is to support the physical, social and emotional wellbeing of students, through the development and delivery of student welfare programs. These programs are designed to foster a caring and tolerant attitude toward others, to ensure mutual respect, a cohesive environment and a sense of belonging is achieved at all times. At Keira there is a strong school-wide commitment to ensure that, for all students, school is a happy, positive and fulfilling experience.

Across all year groups, various programs such as Anti-Harassment and Anti-Bullying, Driver Safety, Cyber Safety and Mental Health programs are implemented in order to support student Wellbeing. Members of the team meet regularly, liaise with staff, parents and outside agencies in order to identify and address the needs of students and initiate positive and proactive change.



CREATIVE and PERFORMING ARTS



Any literature relating to 21st century learning makes mention of 'creativity' as a desirable and necessary quality to enable students to fully participate in their world. Creativity is at the very core of the Key Learning Area Creative and Performing Arts (CAPA).



CAPA at Keira High School all students in Years 7 and 8, as they undertake a mandatory 100 hours of Music and 100 hours of Visual Arts. A significant proportion of students in the years above elect to study a range of subjects in the creative arts: Dance, Drama. Film Making, Music, Photographic and

Digital Media and Visual Arts. Studies in the classroom are well supported by a vital program of co-curricular

activities that extend learning completed during regular school time. Senior Band, Beginner Band, Guitar and Ukulele Ensemble, Dance Ensemble, Performing Arts Evening, Theatresports Team, "Plugged" Concerts, Arts Under the Stars and our biannual Whole School Production are just some of the activities in which students may become involved in the grounds of Keira High School.

Beyond the school students have the opportunity to be part of Southern Stars, Keirabald, ISER Touring ensembles, Theatresports competition and Schools Spectacular.

PERSONAL DEVELOPMENT, HEALTH and PHYSICAL EDUCATION



The Personal Development Health and Physical Education (PDHPE) syllabus offers a unique opportunity to promote the physical, social, emotional, cognitive and spiritual health of students. At Keira, the PDHPE staff meet this opportunity with innovative programs that target and develop the personal strengths of students to empower and prepare them for life after school. PDHPE programs at Keira therefore seek to build the capacity of students to successfully navigate a range of issues impacting their lives such as mental health, nutrition, sexual health, physical activity, social issues, drug use, planning for a career, digital citizenship and appreciating diversity. In addressing these issues, students are guided in developing their capacity as 21st century learners, building knowledge and skill in relation to key traits such as resilience, communication, leadership, problem solving, creativity, critical thinking, team work and independent learning in the process.

The structure of PDHPE programs at Keira ensures that whilst all students develop the ideals mentioned above in the mandatory 7-10 PDHPE curriculum, students wishing to extend their knowledge and skill in PDHPE further may do so by choosing to undertake one of the following elective courses.



STUDENT LEADERSHIP – STUDENT REPRESENTATIVE COUNCIL (SRC) & SPORTS CAPTAINS

Students have opportunities to be students' leaders and must accept the roles and responsibilities that come with the positions. Keira students have a proud history of outstanding school leadership.

Any student failing in their responsibilities and/ or not following school expectations will be at risk of losing their position. They may be on a period of probation or warned, depending upon the circumstances.

STUDENT REPRESENTATIVE COUNCIL (SRC)

A selection process for students wishing to join the SRC is held early in Term 1. Year 8 to 11 students are nominated by themselves or their peers, with nominations given to the SRC Coordinator. Each student is guided through an application process. A selection of students will be interviewed by the Principal and Wellbeing Coordinator.

Year 12 School Captain selection process takes place in Term 3, with nominations submitted to the Deputy Principal of Year 12. A rigorous process is followed which includes an interview with the Principal, Year 11 Year Adviser and current School Student Leaders. The nominated students will present a speech to the school community. Teachers and Year 11 students vote for their preferred candidates. The unsuccessful nominated students will be invited to be part of the SRC.

SPORTS CAPTAINS

Students will meet in their House groups to nominate and vote for Sports Captains, at a meeting in early Term 1, before the swimming carnival.

Sports Captains assist at carnivals and events throughout the year. The winning house based on honours system points are announced at the Yearly Presentation Evening.



SPECIAL RELIGIOUS EDUCATION (SRE)

A feature of the public education system in NSW is the opportunity to provide time in class for education in ethics, faith and morality from a religious or non-religious perspective at the choice of parents.

A parent/carer may at any time notify the school in writing that they wish to change their decision. Students will continue the same arrangement as the previous year, unless a parent/carer has requested a change in writing.

If your preferred SRE or SEE option is not available, please contact the approved provider. Students not attending SRE or SEE are given supervised alternative meaningful activities.

SRE at Keira HS is provided by *Generate* and members of the local community. Students in year 7 are offered the opportunity to participate in Scripture lessons each term. Parents need to indicate if they wish their child to participate in Scripture. A letter is given to each Year 7 student upon enrolment or upon request.

Year 7 students will have SRE lessons scheduled on a rotational basis. They will generally occur once a fortnight. Each class will have it in-lieu of their normal class and this will change from term to term. The regular classroom teacher will supervise students not attending SRE in meaningful activities related to their subject area.

Our SRE teacher also runs a lunchtime program which is open to all students at Keira HS. It is held on the same day as the year 7 program and all students are able to attend.
