From the Principal

Welcome to our latest Newsletter.

I would like to again thank all our students and families for your excellent efforts in continuing with learning and keeping people safe. I have been particularly impressed with the students gaining "Positive Engagement" entries from their teachers for their diligence, reaching out to their teachers and submitting tasks. Their names have been part of the Year Assembly rewards segment, with a number of students receiving officeworks gift vouchers. I understand there are also many students still doing their best, but at times are unable to submit their work or access the internet for a variety of reasons. We acknowledge that learning is still taking place as well as people taking care of their mental health as a priority.

Here is the latest message for the school community from the NSW Department of Education:

Currently the clear message from NSW Health is that families should be keeping children at home unless it is absolutely necessary for them to attend school.

Looking ahead, on Friday 27 August 2021 the Premier announced the return to school roadmap for students in NSW. Students will return to face-to-face learning either through a 'staged return' or 'full return', depending on NSW Health conditions in their area.

Full return (Level 3)

Areas across NSW that are removed from stay-at-home rules will return to school under Level 3 settings. This is a full return for all students to schools, with reduced mingling and on-site activities.

Staged return (Level 3 plus)

Where stay-at-home rules are still in place but high community vaccination and low transmission conditions are met, students will return to school in a staged way. This is a staggered return for prioritised cohorts, with no mingling or on-site activities.

Students in Year 12 and those completing the HSC are already able to return in a limited way and this will continue for the remainder of Term 3 2021. From 25 October 2021, these students will have full-time access to school campuses and their teachers.

Local Government Areas of concern

Identified Local Government Areas (LGAs) and suburbs of concern operating under <u>Level 4 plus</u> restrictions will continue learning from home until we are advised otherwise by NSW Health.

September 2021

Order of return

Students will return to face-to-face learning with NSW Health-approved COVID-safe settings on school sites in the following order:

From 25 October 2021 – Kindergarten, Year 1 and 12

From 1 November 2021 - Years 2, 6 and 11

From 8 November 2021 - Years 3, 4, 5, 7, 8, 9 and 10

We will be providing further advice as we develop our plan for a staged return.

The return to school roadmap is subject to change depending on new information expected through the Public Health Order and additional advice from NSW Health. You can stay up to date with the most recent advice on our <u>Advice for families page</u>.

Vaccinations for school staff

To ensure a COVID-safe return to school, all NSW public school and preschool staff on-site to support the staged return of students will be required to be fully vaccinated. Any contractors, volunteers or people on site who require a Working With Children Check will also be required to have 2 doses of vaccination before returning to our school.

Our staff have been encouraged to make use of the various routes for priority vaccination available to them and to book appointments for whatever vaccine is available as soon as possible. We will continue to work with NSW Health to prioritise vaccinations for all staff across NSW.

All NSW school and preschool staff will be required to be fully vaccinated by 8 November.

The department's <u>COVID-19 webpage</u> is constantly being updated, and outlines the restrictions in our schools as well as other useful information and resources to keep you up to date and supported.

Learning from Home

<u>The learning from home page</u> has a wide range of curriculum-based activities to further supplement your child's learning, if required.

We understand the pressures of parents both supervising learning from home as well as completing their own work. There are some helpful <u>wellbeing tools</u> available to help look after yourself and those around you. Parents are the best judge of what is appropriate for your child to be doing at home. Please don't hesitate to reach out to me or your child's teacher if you need further guidance or something is not working for you.

HSC Students

The HSC exams for 2021 will be rescheduled to start from Tuesday 9 November. The revised timetable will be provided by NESA mid-September. There is new information regarding the HSC being released every week. It is important that parents and students access this information on the <u>NESA website</u> and the department's <u>HSC Hub</u>.

Thank you again for your understanding and support of our school, please do not hesitate to reach out if we can do anything to assist you and your family to help us all get through these challenging times.







3. Timetable and bell times







School Captains and Vice Captains 2021-2022 Elections

The school captains are selected through a rigorous process to lead the school student body and must represent Keira High School as exemplar students in every facet of their operation. Captains are elected in Term 3 every year. We have continued to move through the election process throughout Term 3, with some modifications in response to the learning from home context.

Congratulations to the students who have nominated. These students have been required to submit an application and record a speech addressing the criteria within the application. Year 11 students and staff will view these speeches and then vote on preferred captains. Following this process, students will be selected and invited to interview. The interview panel will consist of a Deputy Principal, Year Adviser and representatives from the current student leadership group. Following the interview process, the selected captains and vice captains will be presented to the Principal for final approval. The student leadership team will be announced in Term 4.

Tell Them From Me

This term, our school will be participating in the Tell Them From Me suite of surveys. This includes student, teacher, and parent surveys. Keira High School has been utilising the Tell Them From Me survey since 2015, gathering feedback from students and parents on our path of continual improvement and community consultation.

An email will be sent to all parents/carers with the details about the survey and how to complete the online survey as a parent and supporting your child in completing the student survey.

Year 11 Alternative Assessment Tasks

Year 11 Yearly Examinations were scheduled to take place from Monday 16 August to Thursday 26 August 2021. As a school, we made the decision to cancel the examinations due to the current context of learning from home. The yearly examinations were replaced with an alternative assessment task for each course and completed by the students across Monday 23 August to Friday 3 September 2021.

Congratulations to Year 11 students on their positive engagement with the alternative assessment tasks. We are exceptionally proud of the resilience, determination and application to your studies you have demonstrated over the assessment period.

Students will be receiving explicit feedback from their classroom teachers and supported in completing a self-reflection process to ensure continued improvement.

Building Towards a Successful HSC

At Keira, we have a strong commitment in supporting students to maximise their success in learning at all stages of their schooling. Next term, our Year 11 students will come to another key transition point as they begin their HSC studies.

Success in the Higher School Certificate is largely determined by quality partnerships between parents, students, and teachers. To support these partnerships, we are holding an online information evening for Year 11 students and their parents/carers as they begin the HSC course.

The online event will be held on Tuesday 12 October 2021 from 6:00 – 7:00 pm.

Adjusted School Fees for 2021

Due to the prolonged nature of the lockdown and consequent financial pressure experienced by many families, it has been deemed appropriate to **reduce** subject fees and voluntary contributions for **2021 by half** of the original amount invoiced.

Parents and Carers who have **already paid for the voluntary contribution and/ or subject fees** from the Statement issued at the beginning of Term 2 will have half the monies paid moved to **Fees in Advance**.

Similarly, payments received for **Terms 2 and 3 Sport** has been moved to **Fees in Advance** minus the portion of 7 weeks in Term 2 that was used for attendance at school sport.

This amount will appear on all future statements by the term 'Unallocated Credit'.

Unallocated credit can be used at any time for future fees, excursions, sporting, and other costs that are payable to the school. They can also be used for siblings who also attend Keira High School.

We are hoping this gesture may ease the burden for many at this time as we continue to navigate the many challenges being experienced by our school community.

The beginning of Term 3 saw us all working together online and during this period students have engaged in online Year Assemblies, Wellbeing Classroom, Whole School Assembly, countless Zoom Meetings, RUOK? Day activities online, Wear it Purple Day awareness and many other events that have focused on enhancing their wellbeing. "When students go back to face-to-face learning whether it be Term 4, 2021 or Term 1, 2022 our aim is to provide schools with a planned catch-up program. We endeavour to catch up all students when they all go back to face-to-face learning.

However, if parents decide to take their child to the GP the current process stands, which means they need to contact the Public Health Unit on 1300 066 055 and withdraw consent from the school program".



From the Year Advisers





I would like to formally introduce myself to the Keira High School community. Many of you already know me because I have been teaching at Keira High School for 27 years and have been relieving as Head Teacher English for the past 10 months. I am thrilled to now be the substantive Head Teacher of English in a school where I have experience, a community that I understand and with children whom I find great joy in teaching. I look forward to working with you to assist your children in their learning.

The English staff have been working strategically to engage your children during online learning.

Year 7 are writing creatively, inspired by our school magazine "Blast Off" with Mr Goodley and Mr Macken creating lessons which focus on building literacy and writing skills in our young writers who will create their own submission for the school magazine. Ms Stares and Ms Musgrove have been taking Year 8 on a journey to appreciate and understand our heritage by responding to poetry by our First Nations Peoples. They are now studying film as text and will be creating their own multimodal film review to be viewed by their teachers.

Year 9 (Mr Pawsey/Ms Knox) and Year 10 (Ms Cara) have travelled back in time to study the greatest influencer of English literature, William Shakespeare. Both year groups are studying tragedies – "Romeo and Juliet" and "Macbeth".

Year 11 have completed their final assessment task for the Preliminary English course. News from Science


This year's National Science Week theme was "Food: Different by Design". Science celebrated virtually, with activities ranging from making edible marshmallow slime to growing gummy bears.

Academic Writing for Success PDHPE

As a PDHPE faculty our goal is to improve a range of literacy skills including writing in students across our year 7-12 cohort. The aim of this academic writing for success process is to enhance the students knowledge and skills to improve their own writing skills in junior years. This will then enable students in senior studies the ability to respond to questions with the confidence that they can clearly articulate their ideas and written responses in the Higher School Certificate. As a faculty we look forward to continuing to build the skills and knowledge of all students in PDHPE with an explicit focus on improving students writing in our subject.

As a faculty we have focused on three explicit areas of students writing.

Ideas	An idea is a thought or notion that is being explained and explored. Students are encouraged to develop their ideas and create insightful and impacting points. Students will support their ideas with evidence and examples.
Cohesion	Features can include connectives such as 'furthermore' and 'therefore', cross references to different parts of the text, and reiteration of the title or terms of the topic or question being addressed in the text.
Text Structure	Is the way that the information is organised. This could include headings and sub-headings, is there an introductory and concluding paragraph.


